





Chaplain's Corner

Marines are fortunate; they get to celebrate two military holidays in November. November 10th is The Marine Corps Birthday and November 11 th is Veterans Day. I am reminded of my first Marine Corps Birthday in 1965 when I was a Private stationed at Camp Lejeune with Mike Company, 3 rd Battalion, 6 th Marine Regiment. I had the honor of hearing General Chesty Puller speak. Row upon row of Marines assembled on the expansive parade ground by battalion and company to hear the Marine's Marine. I can still hear the commands of the Sergeant Major echoing across the parade ground that chilly morning as we stood in formation at parade rest with our every breath visible in the autumn air. The Sergeant Major's call to attention was followed by the thunderclap of thousands of pairs of heels slamming together in unison.

A barrel-chested old man wearing a huge topcoat, to ward off the cold, stepped to the podium. Of course, it wasn't nearly as cold as the Frozen Chosun. But he was much younger then. I do not remember all that the General said that morning. But I do remember this. He told us, "You are greater than Napoleon's Army and you are greater than Caesar's Legions for you have never lost your colors."
